OUR IMPACT IN 2024



Welcome

At the David Nott Foundation, we strive for a world where access to safe, skilled surgical care is a reality for all. Every day, doctors and healthcare professionals work tirelessly to care for their communities while contending with the horrors of war and catastrophe. Health systems are under strain and increasingly under attack.

For an organisation such as The David Nott Foundation, seeing an increase in demand for our products and services worldwide is troubling. Every day, there is more news of violence, and the odds seem increasingly stacked against those who have the least. The continuation and escalation of conflict around the world is palpable. A disorderly international community at the political level only serves to emphasise the importance of non-governmental bodies and civil society groups in tackling some of the intractable challenges we face.

I am immensely proud of our small team in responding to the crises in front of them. We initiated a robust and vital response in Palestine by training doctors set for Gaza on HEST courses in the UK and Kuwait. We increased our localisation commitment in Ukraine: local faculty took part in our HEST-UK course in Edinburgh to develop their skills to deliver future HEST teaching. Our new Ukrainian faculty helped train 226 doctors on 3 courses in Ukraine itself. We broadened our decadelong commitment in Syria, developing the local faculty, delivering HEST courses and investing in women's health, a health

catastrophe created by the conflict. We are doing this by investing in training, equipment and awareness campaigns for those suffering from cervical cancer. In Libya, we broke records and boundaries: we not only trained 103 doctors in one mission but also delivered our first HEST-Obstetrics & Gynaecology course. We see this course as a pioneer and enabler of change in a world in which a maternal death occurs every 2 minutes.

As I begin my tenure as CEO of this fantastic organisation, I want firstly to thank our supporters. I have been overwhelmed by the generosity, collective spirit, enthusiasm and commitment to what we do. It resonates with people in all corners of the world. Without you, we simply cannot do what we do, supporting doctors working in conflict and catastrophe. I would also like to thank the team: Our employees, our faculty, our co-founders and our board of trustees. I would like to thank my predecessor, Elly Nott. Everything you read in this report is a result of her vision and her tireless work in bringing this community together, focused on a single mission. As we come to the end of our first decade of action, we begin the next with so many opportunities to touch more lives and make safe, skilled surgical care a reality for all.

ACTION FOR PALESTINE

We build opportunities

In 2024, we continued supporting medical professionals in Palestine, addressing urgent healthcare needs amid an intensifying Gaza-Israel conflict.

Following the success of our Hostile Environment Surgical Training (HEST)-UK course for doctors heading to Palestine in December 2023, we once again joined with PalMed to train another group of doctors who intend to offer their skills on the frontline. In total, we have trained 80 doctors deploying to Gaza from countries including Germany, Sweden, and Qatar, with some participating in multiple missions.

Our support extends beyond training; our faculty—including Co-founder Professor David Nott—have deployed to Gaza on multiple occasions, joining with organisations deploying medical teams into Gaza.

With backing from the Foreign, Commonwealth & Development Office (FCDO) and the Kuwaiti Red Crescent Society (KRCS), we also trained 24 Kuwaiti surgeons and 12 anaesthetists preparing to volunteer in Gaza. Recognising the importance of adaptability, we taught these doctors to construct a simple anaesthesia machine using components available on-site, a skill that could be crucial in resource-limited hospitals.

Until safe and skilled surgical care is available for everyone, we will continue to do all we can.

LOCALISATION IN UKRAINE

We build trust

This year, we deepened our commitment to Ukraine by focusing on both immediate healthcare needs and long-term localisation efforts. Our goal is to empower Ukrainian healthcare professionals with the skills, resources, and leadership needed to deliver sustainable care amidst conflict. Here's an overview of our achievements in 2024.

Training and capacity building

TRAINING IN MOLDOVA

In response to healthcare challenges amplified by the Ukrainian crisis and answering a request from the World Health Organisation (WHO)-Office for Europe, we held two HEST-Anaesthesia courses in Moldova, training 26 Moldovan anaesthetists.

COURSES IN VINNYTSIA AND POLTAVA

Our work continued within Ukraine. where we trained:



86 medical professionals in Vinnytsia in March; offering them specialised trauma surgery and emergency care training tailored for frontline challenges.



69 medical professionals in Poltava in June, bringing our milestone to over 2,000 healthcare workers trained globally in nine years. These sessions were invaluable for doctors actively treating war casualties, equipping them to handle the complex trauma cases they encounter daily.



71 medical professionals in Kyiv in October. This mission was a milestone. with our HEST course fully run by local Ukrainian faculty and a pilot of our Hostile Environment Surgical Training for Nurses (HEST-N) for 15 frontline nurses.









Strengthening local leadership

EMPOWERING LOCAL INSTRUCTORS

Localisation is a cornerstone of our charitable mission. In June and December, we funded several Ukrainian surgeons to attend our HEST-UK course led by our Co-Founder Professor Nott. This training, held at the Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh, equipped them with advanced skills to lead sessions independently. Following this, a number of these professionals returned to Ukraine and joined our courses as official faculty members, teaching and helping build a sustainable, locally -led training model that can continue for years to come.

Beyond instructor training, our localisation efforts include employing key programme team members within Ukraine, building partnerships with local suppliers, and aligning our strategy closely with the Ministry of Health and affiliated bodies.



DELIVERING IMPACT IN LIBYA

We build resilience

Libya has faced political turmoil and unrest for the past 13 years with conflict persisting among armed groups.

In February we trained 103 doctors in Tripoli, Libya, the largest number trained in one mission, empowering them to save lives in conflict. These doctors are now equipped to perform complex procedures with confidence.

We partnered with the Libyan Board of Medical Specialties to deliver four surgical training courses in parallel. Over five intense days, our team of expert trainers delivered two HEST- courses for surgeons, two HEST-Anaesthesia courses and a brand-new HEST-O&G obstetrics and gynaecology course. Doctors we'd

previously upskilled in Libya also joined our training faculty and led the teaching of several of our modules for the first time, demonstrating our commitment to localising our impact.

We build innovations

For thirteen years the David Nott Foundation has supported Syria's dedicated healthcare professionals. We look forward to continuing to assist our partners and faculty as they navigate the next steps at this time of change and make safe, skilled surgical care a reality for all Syrians.

APRIL-MAY MISSION WITH ACTION FOR HUMANITY

We partnered with Action for Humanity to deliver training and surgical support in Northwest Syria. This mission was a dual effort: while three of our international faculty, including Co-Founder Professor David Nott, provided hands-on instruction, our local Syrian faculty also led parts of the HEST training, building local expertise and capacity. Together, we trained 33 Syrian doctors, equipping them with advanced trauma care skills and surgical techniques crucial for treating war-related injuries. This mission also included an operative component, where Professor David Nott performed surgery on patients allowing doctors to learn through practical application and immediate patient care.

NOVEMBER MISSION WITH THE WORLD HEALTH ORGANISATION

We embarked on a new collaboration with the World Health Organisation (WHO), marking our first partnership with them in Syria. This mission was a significant milestone, as it was part of the WHO's broader strategy to strengthen trauma care and emergency preparedness in Northwest Syria. Recognising our Hostile Environment Surgical Training (HEST) courses as an integral part of this effort, WHO invited us to deliver specialised training for Syrian medical teams.

Two of our international faculty members, alongside 14 local faculty, trained 25 doctors, focusing on trauma response and surgical interventions that are critically needed in Syria.

BUILDING SUSTAINABLE HEALTHCARE CAPACITY IN SYRIA

Our missions, scholarships and ongoing support demonstrate our commitment to a sustainable programme in Syria. By empowering local Syrian instructors and collaborating with organisations like Action for Humanity, the WHO and local health system governance actors; we are helping to support a resilient, selfsustaining medical community capable of responding to crises.

INNOVATION

Building capacity within the health system involves different specialties that address injuries caused by conflict but also areas of care that have been neglected. To address these needs, this year we developed the Hostile Environment Surgical Training for Obstetrics and Gynaecology (HEST-O&G), delivering it for the first time in Libya in February.

The course covers a variety of common scenarios in maternal and neonatal health emergencies. Participants begin with neonatal and maternal trauma training before moving into obstetrics to understand the complexities of childbirth emergencies. Beyond the medical realm, our trainers advocate for a holistic approach to maternal health in their teaching.

It's not just about reducing mortality rates, it's about understanding the wider implications of maternal deaths on families, communities, and societies at large.

In addition, this year we began the development of the Hostile Environment Surgical Course for Nurses (HEST-N). Nurses play a vital role within the health system, often being the first responders and providing continuous patient care long after doctors have stabilised initial trauma cases. In conflict zones, where resources are scarce and medical needs are urgent, their expertise becomes even more critical. We piloted an early version of the course for the first time in Ukraine in October, training 15 nurses. We continue to review and develop this course to ensure the content meets both

course to ensure the content meets both the requirements of the recipients and the mission of the organisation.

THE TDNF & FDNF CONFERENCE

We build leaders

We are deeply grateful for the unwavering support of our Friends of the David Nott Foundation (FDNFs) and **Trainees of the David Nott Foundation** (TDNFs) volunteer societies. Whether they are raising funds or convening conferences and webinars, our network of FDNF and TDNF groups are an essential global community for sustaining our mission.

This year, we celebrated a total of 21 national and 4 international FDNF societies, and welcome 13 TDNF committee members supporting 50 members from over 10 countries. These dedicated supporters not only help raise awareness and funds but also help members gain experience in the humanitarian sector.

CONFERENCES

This year we held our first TDNF conference, a hybrid event at the University of Salford. The conference attracted 200 medical professionals from various specialties and international locations, including Yemen, Pakistan, Albania, Nigeria, Poland, UAE, Ethiopia, Thailand, Malawi, and many more. The day was full of comprehensive lectures and workshops. Our faculty provided the trainees with insights into working in war zones.

We also held our third Friends of David Nott Foundation (FDNF) conference, hosted this year by our FDNF at the University of Cambridge in the Clinical School of Medicine. This event brought together 45 dedicated FDNF members from universities across the UK. The conference, led by our faculty members, featured four specialised workshops focusing on vascular surgery, orthopaedics, paediatrics, and general trauma.

THE FDNF IN CONGO

This year we were contacted by a medical student to set up an FDNF in the DRC. our first ever in Africa. In support of the Congolese doctors we provided funding for teaching tools to upskill doctors in Kabare's territory at the Murhesa Medical Center.

BUILDING CONNECTIONS AT PARLIAMENT

In February, we partnered with CT Group to host a special event at Parliament, where we engaged with Members of Parliament (MPs) and expanded our network of supporters for our work in Ukraine, Gaza, Syria, and beyond. This event fostered meaningful conversations about our mission and helped strengthen relationships with key stakeholders.

AMPLIFYING OUR VOICE ON THE GLOBAL STAGE

Our CEO, Dr James Gough, also made significant strides in raising awareness at the global level. As an alumnus of the McCain Institute Global Leaders Program, he attended the UN General Assembly, where he shared valuable insights on global humanitarian challenges and highlighted the critical role the David Nott Foundation plays in addressing healthcare needs in conflict zones.


DOCTOR THEATRE RAISES VITAL FUNDS

BETTY BOOTHROYD SCHOLARSHIP

We build capability

This year, we announced the launch of the Betty Boothroyd Scholarship Fund. The programme provides opportunities for doctors and health researchers from the conflict-affected states in which we operate. It is named in honour of the late Baroness Betty Boothroyd, our Founding Patron and a passionate supporter of our work.

This programme not only aims to provide advanced surgical capability but also contribute to the development of health systems, cultivate local leaders, and enable doctors and healthcare workers to become mentors, advocates, and catalysts for change within their health systems. The Betty Boothroyd Scholarship Fund helps build resilient health networks that can endure and adapt to the challenges of conflict, ultimately fostering a new generation of medical professionals dedicated to improving healthcare access and outcomes in their communities.

We are thrilled to announce Dr Munzer Alkhalil is the first recipient of the Betty Boothroyd Scholarship. Dr Alkhalil is a Syrian public health specialist advisor and researcher with a medical background and over a decade of leadership in conflict-affected health systems.

His research will focus on the importance of developing locally-led health responses, including surgical care in conflict zones. As demonstrated in Syria's response to the earthquake and previous crises, robust surgical networks that can function independently and improve medical training and education are crucial, especially when external resources are scarce. We know surgical capacity strengthening is not an isolated function, but an integral part of a broader humanitarian and health response. which currently faces many limitations. Our Foundation understands that we cannot train doctors in isolation and, as a development organisation, must use our position to help build insights into effective health systems that surround that surgical capability.

From davidnottfoundation.com to posters to social media posts, a unified identity ensures that our message is clear, no matter where people encounter us.








SUPPORT HEALTHCARE **INNOVATORS**

We are committed to developing a longterm partnership with the Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh to deliver a cadaveric course in the UK. This will train potential DNF faculty members from conflict-affected regions, ensuring high-quality training for local instructors.
